TIPRO workforce analysis shows steady job growth for Texas' upstream sector in March and April

Texas upstream oil and natural gas employment is rising, recent analysis by the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association (TIPRO) shows. Citing the latest Current Employment Statistics (CES) reports from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), TIPRO highlights steady employment gains for the Lone Star State's upstream sector and strong industry recruitment activity during the months of [March](#) and [April](#).

Upstream employment in Texas grew by 1,800 jobs in March, said TIPRO, led by support activities (+1,200 jobs) and oil and natural gas extraction (+600 jobs). Employment growth for the industry continued in April, the association also noted, with an additional 400 jobs added. Notably, a 1,700-job increase last month in support activities completely offset a 1,300-job decline in extraction.

Texas in both months led the nation in recruitment, with unique job postings climbing 7 percent in March (9,110 listings) and then growing by another 7 percent in April to reach 9,780. Nationally, industry job listings topped 61,000 in April. Support activities consistently led specific sector listings, according to TIPRO. Houston, Midland, and Odessa anchored the state's hiring hotspots, the association also reported.

Loves (591), Baker Hughes (321), Energy Transfer (295), and ExxonMobil (249) had the most unique job postings in April, said TIPRO. Top posted industry occupations included maintenance and repair workers general (291), heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers (282) and retail salespersons (280).

"Texas oil and gas employment trends highlight the industry's strength and adaptability amid severe global energy market disruption. As international supply chains remain constrained and global inventories draw at record rates, Texas producers have sustained strong operational activity, supported rising employment and delivered increasing volumes of crude oil and LNG to both domestic markets and key international allies," TIPRO President Ed Longanecker commented. "These results demonstrate Texas' critical role in helping stabilize global energy supplies and supporting economic growth at home during a period of heightened volatility."

Referencing the TIPRO workforce analysis, Texas Railroad Commissioner Wayne Christian in a [statement](#) last week celebrated the recent growth in jobs across the state's oil and gas industry, renewed momentum in drilling activity and improving conditions for energy markets. "The market is sending a clear signal," Christian said. "Stronger demand is driving renewed production and job growth across the oil industry. When producers have confidence in demand, production grows, which strengthens communities, supports energy security, and fuels opportunity."



Small independent producers could get regulatory relief from federal air rules under new bill

Bicameral legislation filed recently by U.S. Congressman August Pfluger (TX-11) and U.S. Senator Cynthia Lummis (R-WY) seeks to help protect small energy producers from onerous Biden-era federal air emission rules. Without targeted regulatory relief and action to safeguard smaller independent producers from burdensome federal methane reporting and emissions control requirements implemented by the last administration, many small producers risk shutting down wells that American energy dominance depends on, say lawmakers.

The Protect Domestic Oil and Gas Small Business Act of 2026, H.R. 8990, would amend the Clean Air Act to exempt low-producing marginal or "stripper" wells from federal regulations that were intended for large emissions sources. Nationally, stripper wells account for approximately 7 percent of domestic oil production while producing less than one-half of one percent of annual methane emissions.

The bill is supported in the House by Representatives Jodey Arrington (TX-19), Troy Balderson (OH-12), Jake Ellzey (TX-06), Ron Estes (KS-04), Julie Fedorchak (ND-At-Large), Craig Goldman (TX-12), Bob Latta (OH-05), Tracey Mann (KS-01), Randy Weber (TX-14), Roger Williams (TX-25), and Gabe Evans (CO-08). In the Senate, it is supported by Senators Pete Ricketts (R-NE), Steve Daines (R-MT), Jerry Moran (R-KS), Kevin Cramer (R-ND), and John Barrasso (R-WY).

"America's energy security depends on the strength of our domestic production, and small producers are a critical part of that equation," said Congressman Pfluger. "Too often, these operators are disadvantaged by costly, one-size-fits-all regulations that were never designed with their operations in mind. Through targeted, commonsense reforms to the Clean Air Act, this bill will help keep small producers in business, protect American jobs, and preserve the stable domestic energy supply our economy depends on."

"*The Protect Domestic Oil and Gas Small Business Act* protects hundreds of small businesses and supports good-paying jobs by ensuring durable protection against shifting regulatory priorities across administrations," added Senator Lummis.

Getting ahead of Senate Bill 1150: What independent operators need to know now

Senate Bill 1150 will require Texas operators to plug inactive wells meeting specific age and inactivity thresholds, and the Railroad Commission's rulemaking process is just getting started. For large operators with dedicated compliance teams, this is a manageable workload. For small independents running dozens or hundreds of wells across multiple leases, it is a different conversation.

The challenge most operators will face is not the intent to comply — it is operational visibility. Many independents do not have a reliable, centralized view of which wells are approaching inactive status, what their current production trends look like, or which leases carry the greatest regulatory exposure. That information exists in SCADA logs, field reports, and legacy databases that rarely talk to each other.

The operators best positioned for SB 1150 are those who establish that visibility now, before the Commission finalizes its rulemaking. Real-time monitoring of well activity — production rates, pressure trends, run status — gives operators a defensible, timestamped record of well behavior and the lead time to make informed decisions about reactivation, transfer, or planned plugging on their own terms rather than under regulatory pressure.

The window between now and formal rulemaking is an opportunity, not just a countdown. Operators who use it to get their well data in order will have more options, lower costs, and stronger compliance footing when the rules take effect.

Texas Senate Natural Resources Committee schedules August interim hearing

The Texas Senate Committee on Natural Resources will meet at the Texas Capitol in Austin this August for a public hearing covering legislative charges assigned for the interim period by Texas Lieutenant Governor Dan Patrick. Before next year's 90th Legislative Session, the committee has been tasked with providing oversight of relevant agencies and programs under the committee's jurisdiction, which includes the Railroad Commission of Texas (RRC), Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) and the Texas General Land Office (GLO). At its hearing scheduled for Tuesday, August 11, the committee also will be closely looking at the implementation of important legislation passed in 2025 by the 89th Legislature, including the following:

- [Senate Bill 1145](#) (89th Legislature), relating to the authority of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality to issue permits for the land application of water produced from certain mining and oil and gas extraction operation.
- [House Bill 49](#) (89th Legislature), relating to the treatment and beneficial use of fluid oil and gas waste and related material, including a limitation on liability for that treatment or use.

Members of the Natural Resources Committee will also review wildfire prevention and mitigation strategies at their August hearing, as the state continues to try to improve the long-term resiliency of Texas communities against the rising threat of catastrophic wildfires. The committee is slated to evaluate the effectiveness of fuel management practices, including prescribed burns and mechanical thinning, to reduce fuel loading on public and private lands, assess the vulnerability of utility infrastructure in high-risk areas and the adequacy of early warning systems. The panel will then work on recommendations on enhancing state and local coordination in wildfire responses.

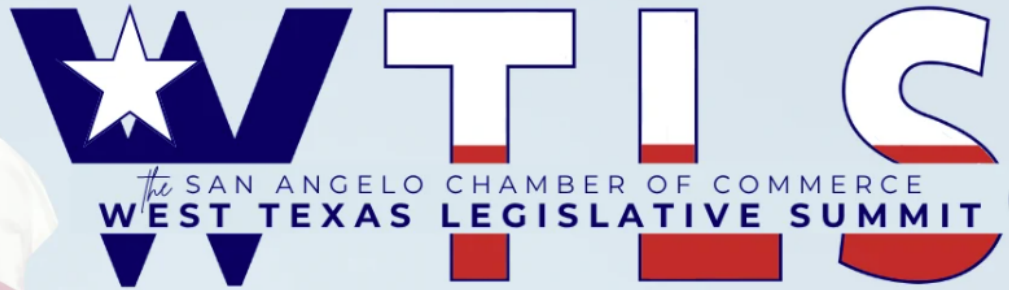

TCEQ offering \$16.5 million in grants for projects using new technologies to reduce emissions

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) is now accepting applications for its New Technology Implementation Grant (NTIG) program. Grants are available statewide under the NTIG program for eligible projects that cut emissions from facilities and other stationary sources in Texas, including oil and gas projects that reduce emissions from upstream, midstream and downstream oil and gas activities such as replacing, repowering or retrofitting compressor engines or installing systems to minimize gas loss, flaring or combustion. A total of \$16.5 million is available through the grant program and will be awarded on a competitive basis.

French, Paxton, Middleton pull off victories in Texas' primary run-off elections

The Texas primary runoff election held on May 26, 2026, delivered a momentous change in the state's political landscape, signaling a decisive shift toward the "MAGA" wing of the Republican Party and setting the stage for a high-stakes general election in November.

Notably, Republican activist and dedicated MAGA conservative Bo French defeated incumbent Jim Wright in the GOP run-off for Texas Railroad commissioner, despite Wright having the endorsements of Governor Greg Abbott, Lt. Governor Dan Patrick and House Speaker Dustin Burrows. French now advances to a match up against Democratic state Rep. Jon Rosenthal in November's general election for a seat on the three-commissioner panel that presides over the governing body that regulates the state's oil and gas industry.

Meanwhile, in the GOP run-off for U.S. Senate, Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton defeated incumbent John Cornyn by a 28-point margin (earning approximately 64 percent of the vote to 36 percent). Paxton was fueled by an eleventh-hour endorsement from President Donald Trump given just days before the primary run-off, which seemingly boosted Paxton's standing to secure his party's nomination. He now faces state Rep. James Talarico (D-Round Rock) in November's general election in the race for Senate.

Also of note, Galveston state Senator Mayes Middleton, who is president of Middleton Oil Company, an independent oil and gas company, in the primary run-off secured the GOP nomination for attorney general, after defeating Chip Roy, a fourth-term Austin congressman. Middleton will now face his former colleague, Dallas state Senator Nathan Johnson, in November in the state's open race for attorney general.

Trump Administration issues new guidance for the State Orphaned Wells Grant Program

Leaders of the U.S. Department of Interior have put out [new guidance](#) for the State Orphaned Wells Grant Program, which distributes federal funding appropriated by the *Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act* to plug, remediate and reclaim orphaned oil and gas wells on state and private land. The latest guidance follows other program revisions made by the Interior Department last summer to cut red tape, reduce burdens on state grant recipients and help states to act faster to clean up orphaned wells.

"The new guidance unlocks additional resources for states to build on their current successes," explained Eva Vrana, deputy assistant secretary for policy and environmental management. "It means states can continue successfully plugging orphaned wells while strengthening energy infrastructure and reducing environmental risks."

The just-released Phase 3 State Formula Grant Guidance by the Interior replaces previous formula grant guidance and opens a new application window that makes all remaining formula grant funds available to states, currently \$798,198,793.

Before reforms were made by the Trump Administration to the federal Orphaned Wells State Formula Grant Program, Texas regulatory leaders had [voiced concerns](#) over the significant hurdles and bureaucracy inherent in the Orphaned Well Plugging Program under the Biden Administration, which resulted in increased plugging costs and significantly delayed well plugging. Efforts to streamline the program by Secretary of the Interior Doug Burgum and other department officials have been well received and will ensure taxpayer funds are used in the most efficient manner to plug as many orphaned wells as possible.

Over the next two years, Texas expected to lead natural gas pipeline capacity additions

Accelerating buildout of natural gas pipeline infrastructure, particularly in the state of Texas, will allow energy producers more ways of supplying natural gas to residential, power and industrial users, as well as LNG export terminals that will bring more natural gas to allies around the world. A new [report](#) from the U.S. Energy Information Administration (EIA) shows developers are planning to bring a massive tranche of new takeaway capacity online over the next two years, which will ease ongoing constraints and limitations in gas takeaway. Approximately 44.9 billion cubic feet per day (Bcf/d) of new pipeline capacity is coming online in the United States in 2026 and 2027, EIA analysts project. More than 66 percent (29.7 Bcf/d) of the capacity additions originate in Texas, notes the EIA, followed by Louisiana with 19 percent (8.4 Bcf/d) of total capacity additions and Virginia with 1.6 Bcf/d capacity expected to come online by the end of 2027.
